Craigie Heights PS Context

Craigie Heights Primary School is an Independent Public School. In 2023 we had an enrolment of 392 students from Kindergarten to Year 6. The school has an Index of Community Socio-Educational Advantage of 1031 which is just over the Australian mean of 1000.

In 2023, our school population included 11 students that recognised as being Aboriginal, 3 students with English as an additional language and 9 students who had individual disability funds allocation.

We have a dedicated and highly capable team of teachers and support staff that provide innovative and engaging programs that meet the needs of all students in a caring, supportive environment.

We work closely with nearby schools in the Joondalup Learning Community, which networks effectively to support a strong improvement focus. Students predominantly enrol at Belridge Senior College.

Community involvement and support for the school continues to grow and is a real strength. Both our School Board and P&C are effective groups that represent the parents and wider community.


Progress Against Identified Priorities & Student Achievement

2023 NAPLAN Results - Craigie Heights Primary School

Numeracy

Year 3 scores show that Craigie Heights PS was just slightly below Like Schools for Numeracy.

Year 5 scores show our school sitting below Like Schools for Numeracy.

Our 2023 results on progress show that our students in Years 3 and 5 fell below "like schools" in Numeracy. Progress data for Year 3 to Year 5 is not available in 2023 as the reporting system has been modified since COVID.

2023 has been the first uninterrupted year of teaching and testing since pre COVID. Results across the board have been erratic during this period of time. The 2024 testing program will provide more consolidated information.

In 2024 we continue making the change away from one resource to a more eclectic approach to the teaching and learning program in Mathematics.


We are planning significant professional learning for staff, incorporating explicit teaching, warm ups, First Steps in Mathematics strategies and key understandings to have consistent and connected quality pedagogical practices. We will be using data to track student progress and refine our teaching programs across the year.

Progress Against Identified Priorities & Student Achievement

Reading

Year 3 scores show that Craigie Heights PS was **just below** Like Schools for Reading.

Year 5 scores show our school is also sitting **below** Like Schools for Reading.

Our 2023 results show our student's results have fallen slightly below those of "like schools". We still have a large percentage of students making very low or low progress. We would like to improve on this.

Progress data for Year 3 to Year 5 is not available in 2023 as the reporting system has been modified since COVID.

In 2024, we continue with the implementation of a synthetic phonics program PLD across our K, PP, Year 1 and Year 2 classes. This will build on the foundations skills already developing in our junior students.

2023 also saw the introduction of the Year 1 Phonics Screening Check which will continue in 2024.


Macglit and MiniLit continues to support our students who are requiring extra intervention.

Our year 3-6 classes will continue to implement quality teaching and learning and will be exploring further ways to consolidate and improve on reading achievement.

Progress Against Identified Priorities & Student Achievement

Writing

Year 3 scores show that Craigie Heights PS is 24 points **below** Like Schools for Writing. Year 5 scores show our school has achieved 17 points **below** Like Schools for Writing.



Craigie Heights Primary School Business Plan 2022 – 2024 sets a target: "Moderate to very high progress are evident for Reading, Writing and Numeracy in On Entry to Year 3 NAPLAN and Year 3 NAPLAN to Year 5 NAPLAN for the stable cohort".

In 2023 our students fell below "like schools" in Writing.

There is no data available for progress for writing due to the nature of the On Entry testing and the reporting system being modified post COVID.

In 2024, Craigie Heights PS will continue the delivery of the quality program "Talk for Writing". This approach combined with Brightpath, the tool we use to assess and analyse student writing, will continue to drive our planning to improve student writing. A writing schedule will support a balanced and sequenced approach to introducing, consolidating and progressing student writing across a variety of genres.

Student National Opinion Survey

In 2023, year 5 and 6 students participated in the Student National Opinion survey.

The School Business Plan 1.6 Measure reads—Increase the average score from 2022-2024 in items as identified as challenges in the National Opinion Survey.

To develop a baseline for this measure a survey of year 5 and 6 students occurred using the Student National Opinion Survey. The results identified a very positive view of the school from the students. The data gathered has been compared to the previous survey in 2020. This shows across positive increases in rating except in two areas remaining the same as 2020.

We will continue to develop student voice opportunities through restorative circles, student leadership groups and pastoral care initiatives to ensure identified challenges such as "Student behaviour is well managed at my school" and "My school takes my opinions seriously" are supported to see achieve our measurable business plan target and importantly student positivity about their school.
