DEAR PARENTS / CARERS:

Kaya! Week 7 and the season of Bunuru continues to spoil us with beautiful weather. The year 5 and 6 students were certainly delighted to spend their mornings recently at Mullaloo Beach taking part in swimming lessons. The conditions were pristine and made for an enjoyable experience for everyone. Well done to all students who participated and our four pillars of expectations being demonstrated so well in the wider community.

NAPLAN

There is always considerable commentary across media platforms when NAPLAN commences across Australian schools. It is difficult to not get caught up in the media frenzy and expert opinions that are shared about the impact on NAPLAN assessment on students and schools. We know that NAPLAN is a mandated assessment process across Australia. All schools participate in this assessment platform. We need to understand the value of NAPLAN and how we at Craigie Heights ensure that NAPLAN testing is just another day at school. NAPLAN provides achievement and progress data on our students. NAPLAN allows us to expose student understandings so we can learn more about what they know and where they need to go to bridge any gaps in learning. This is the exact same philosophy we have for all school based assessments we conduct with students at our school. The only difference being that we don't get media coverage of the many school based assessments that our students participate in! NAPLAN is another measure for us to make judgements on our teaching and learning programs. NAPLAN data is used in the same way we use a school based spelling test, a reading test or maths test. We get the results, we analyse performance, we look for strengths and weaknesses and make plans to address the gaps. So we ask parents and carers to support our approach that NAPLAN is just another day at school and to try your best. We want Craigie Heights students to feel comfortable participating in NAPLAN just like they do on any other day a teacher springs an assessment task on them. NAPLAN will be conducted over the next week for our year 3 and 5 students. We look forward to learning more about student understandings and how this aligns with the data we gather and the plans we will put in place to progress individual and cohort learning further.

We are seeing cases rise across the school again. Please keep students' home when COVID-19 positive until symptoms have cleared. We will be provided a further supply of RATs in the coming weeks that are free for families. We will distribute these before and after school once they are delivered to us.

Ground maintenance and upgrades

The tennis/basketball courts are currently being upgraded with resurfacing and painting. This has been funded by DoE Finance. The courts should be completed this week with the surface open for use the following week. This has been a \$23000 renovation project. We are excited to see the finished product and use the courts again.

Staffing challenges

You may be aware of the significant staffing challenges that are currently impacting schools across Australia. This is another topical conversation in the media that brings opinions and government responses and promises. We are not immune to these staffing challenges at Craigie Heights as we have felt the impact already this year when endeavouring to access relief teachers when our teachers are absent. When we are unable to find a relief teacher through the many platforms we access we often have to close specialist programs for the day to cover a classroom or cancel a specialist program as there is not a relief teacher available. We act flexibly to ensure the integrity of our educational service continues for our students, however, the shortages in our system present organisational challenges. Our staff are to be commended for their flexibility to carry on when a teacher can't be found to fill a gap. We thank our community for support and understanding where a program may be modified for the day due to the challenges of accessing teachers for absences.

School Board Nominations

We are calling for nominations to fill two vacant parent representative positions on our school board. Where there are more nominations received by the closing date than positions available a school community election will be conducted. A nomination form is an appendix to this newsletter. Interested parent or carers can contact the principal for further information on the roles and responsibilities and function of the school board. Nominations must be received by close of business 4.00pm on Wednesday 5 April. Thank you for considering this opportunity to be involved in school governance.

Student Information updates

As a dynamic environment we are always mitigating risks for the safety of staff and students. One very important aspect is the need for parents or carers to update school records for contacts and Family Court Orders. We prioritise the safety of all staff and students and are governed by Department of Education policies and guidelines when making decisions that support a safe school environment. It is vital, therefore, that where family court orders are in a place that the school has current orders for us to respond to. The failure in not providing current orders to the school ensures the school provides equal access to a child for both legal guardians. If you have any queries on this issue, please come and chat with our administration team.

Dogs on school grounds

With the exception of Service and Therapy Dogs, dogs are not permitted on the school grounds at Craigie Heights PS. The Principal must have provided permission for a dog to be on school property; or the dog is a registered guide dog/assistance dog and is being controlled by a person who is blind/deaf or partially blind/disabled to assist them with that disability. Thank you for your understanding and support to ensure the safety of all at our school.





NAPLAN Information for parents and carers

Why do students do NAPLAN?

NAPLAN is a national literacy and numeracy assessment that students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 sit each year. It is the only national assessment all Australian students have the opportunity to undertake.

As students progress through their school years, it's important to check how well they are learning the essential skills of reading, writing and numeracy.

NAPLAN assesses the literacy and numeracy skills that students are learning through the school curriculum and allows parents/carers to see how their child is progressing against national standards and over time.

NAPLAN is just one aspect of a school's assessment and reporting process. It doesn't replace ongoing assessments made by teachers about student performance, but it can provide teachers with additional information about students' educational progress.

NAPLAN also provides schools, education authorities and governments with information about how education programs are working and whether young Australians are achieving important educational outcomes in literacy and numeracy.

Your child will do the NAPLAN tests online

Schools have transitioned from paper-based to computer-based assessments. All Year 3 students will continue to complete the writing assessment on paper.

Online NAPLAN tests provide more precise results and are more engaging for students. One of the main benefits is tailored (or adaptive) testing, where the test presents questions which may be more or less difficult depending on a student's responses.

Tailored testing allows a wider range of student abilities to be assessed and measures student achievement more precisely. A student's overall NAPLAN result is based on both the number and complexity of questions they answer correctly. Your child should not be concerned if they find questions challenging; they may be taking a more complex test pathway.

What does NAPLAN assess?

NAPLAN assesses literacy and numeracy skills that students are learning through their regular school curriculum.

Students sit assessments in writing, reading, conventions of language (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and numeracy. The questions assess content linked to the Australian Curriculum: English and Mathematics.

All government and non-government education authorities contribute to the development of NAPLAN test materials.

Participation in NAPLAN

NAPLAN is for everyone. ACARA supports inclusive testing so all students have the opportunity to participate in the national assessment program.

Adjustments are available for students with disability who have diverse functional abilities and needs.

Schools should work with parents/carers and students to identify, on a case-by-case basis, reasonable adjustments required for individual students with disability to access NAPLAN. Adjustments should reflect the support normally provided for classroom assessments.

To help inform these decisions, you may consult the NAPLAN public demonstration site, the Guide for schools to assist students with disability to access NAPLAN, or our series of videos where parents/carers, teachers and students share their experiences in using NAPLAN adjustments.

In exceptional circumstances, a student with a disability that severely limits their capacity to participate in the assessment, or a student who has recently arrived in Australia and has a non-English speaking background, may be granted a formal exemption.

Your school principal and your local test administration authority can give you more information on adjustments for students with disability or the process required to gain a formal exemption.







What if my child is absent from school on NAPLAN days?

Where possible, schools may arrange for individual students who are absent at the time of testing to complete missed tests at another time during the school's test schedule.

What if my school is closed on NAPLAN days?

Schools with compelling reasons may be given permission to schedule tests after the 9-day test window.

What can I do to support my child?

Students are not expected to study for NAPLAN. You can support your child by reassuring them that NAPLAN is a part of their school program and reminding them to simply do their best. Some familiarisation and explanation of NAPLAN is useful to help students understand and be comfortable with the format of the tests. Teachers will ensure students are familiar with the types of questions in the tests and will provide appropriate support and quidance.

ACARA does not recommend excessive preparation for NAPLAN or the use of services by coaching providers.

NAPLAN timetable

The NAPLAN test window is 9 days. This is to accommodate schools that may have fewer devices.

The NAPLAN test window starts on Wednesday 15 March and finishes on Monday 27 March 2023. Schools are advised to schedule the tests as soon as possible within the testing window, prioritising the first week.

How is my child's performance reported?

Individual student performance is shown on a national achievement scale for each assessment. This scale indicates whether the student is meeting expectations for the literacy and numeracy skills needed to participate fully in that year level.

A NAPLAN individual student report will be provided by your child's school later in the year. If you do not receive a report, you should contact your child's school.

How are NAPLAN results used?

- Students and parents/carers may use individual results to discuss progress with teachers.
- Teachers use results to help identify students who need greater challenges or extra support.
- Schools use results to identify strengths and areas of need to improve teaching programs, and to set goals in literacy and numeracy.
- School systems use results to review the effectiveness of programs and support offered to schools.
- The community can see information about the performance of schools over time at myschool.edu.au.



Expected behaviours when parking

Do

- ★ Obey all street signs
- ★ Be courteous
- ★ Ask for permission to park on someone's verge
- * Park further away and walk
- ★ Leave car at home if possible

Do not

- ★ Park in the Kiss & Drive (stay in your car)
- ★ Block driveways
- ★ Park/stop on footpaths
- ★ Park/stop on verges without permission
- ★ Park/stop within 10m of an intersection
- ★ Park facing against the flow of traffic
- ★ Double park

Expected behaviours of school drivers

- ★ Always be aware of children and their unpredictable movements.
- ★ Adhere, at all times, to the 40km per hour speed limit around the school.
- ★ Parents/carers are not permitted to enter the staff carpark unless they are visiting the dentist or have a current ACROD sticker.
- ★ U turns on Spinaway Street are very dangerous. As you leave the Kiss & Drive area, continue up Spinaway Street.
- ★ Allow enough time to get your child to and from school safely.
- ★ Try to use nearby parking facilities such as the church car park or parks, then walk a short distance to school.
- ★ Plan your trip so you arrive on the school side of the road.

Parking Availability

- * Carpark outside the Early Childhood Area
- ★ Along the oval on Spinaway Street (designated bays)
- ★ Craigie Baptist Church (please be respectful)



Parking on Verges

Consent must be obtained from the owner or occupier of land (or property) before a person may drive, park, or stand a vehicle on the road verge adjacent to that land. If consent has not been provided by the owners or occupier, they may report details of the offending vehicle to the City of Joondalup Rangers.





Kiss & Drive

Kiss & Drive zones allow parents/carers to pick up and drop off children close to the main school entrance. These areas are not to be used for parking. Children are to exit their cars on the kerb side. The Kiss & Drive zones enable the traffic to flow smoothly.



Bike Safety

It is fantastic that so many of our families choose to walk or ride their bike/scooter to school. Although the bike racks are locked during the day, there are periods of time when they are open. We strongly advise families to add to the security by using a lock to secure their bikes and scooters to the railings. Students need to walk their bicycles and scooters onto and off the school grounds. This is for the safety of both the pedestrians and the bicycle/scooter users.

It is vital that students wear a helmet. One of our expected behaviours at Craigie Heights is to wear a helmet when on a bike/scooter.
